

Dear Students,

Summer is the perfect time to become lost in a good book. One of the major benefits of reading is how it contributes to our personal growth. Reading allows you to learn from the experiences of others.

You will be required to read *Okay For Now* by Gary Schmidt and 2 other books from the following list. However, please don't limit yourself! Read for enjoyment and growth this summer! Read and discuss books with your friends and family!

As you read, it is important to be aware of your thinking. To help guide your thinking while you read, ask yourself the following questions and respond:

The following assignment is for the required novel for students in Grades 7 and 8. This assignment is required to be typed and submitted via email to your teachers by August 26. Be sure to write in complete sentences with proper punctuation and well-developed paragraphs.

Your entries will be assessed for insightfulness of content. Be prepared to have a literature discussion with your classmates during Orientation Cycle.

- Who are the main characters and how would you describe them? How do the characters relate to one another? What are their needs?
- Where does this story take place? What is this place like? When did this story take place? Have you ever been to a place like this? If not, would you like to visit a place like this? Why or why not?
- What is the conflict or problem that the characters are facing? Remember that there are often minor
 difficulties that the characters are dealing with, but those issues are resolved quickly in the story. The
 main conflict can be followed throughout the book; the little problems usually encircle the big issue.
- Due to the problem the characters are facing, the main characters will frequently undergo some kind of change or will experience personal growth, in order to resolve the conflict. What lesson did the main character(s) learn as a result of overcoming the problem? Can you make a personal connection to this lesson or the "big idea"? Explain.
- Draw a significant image/scene and explain in a short paragraph why you thought it was significant.
- Write a letter to one of the characters. (One page in friendly letter format.)

□ A creative illustration. This should be eye-catching and reflect an important part of the book. Your illustration can be hand drawn, with colored pencils or markers, or designed on the computer. (This must be an original creation.)

☐ In the top section of the panel, including a rating of this book with a detailed explanation in paragraph form (100 words). (10)

☐ In the bottom section, include your favorite quote from the book with a detailed explanation in paragraph form of who said it, to whom it was said, why it was said, and why you like the quote (100 words). (10)			
Front Cover Flap / 15			
☐ In the upper section of the flap, include a summary of the major events that occur in the book			
in paragraph form (150 words). (10)			
☐ At the very bottom of the flap, include your name and date. (5)			
Back Cover Flap / 20 ☐ In the upper section of the flap, include a small picture of author with a short biography of author (50 words). (10)			
☐ In the lower section of the flap, write a short explanation of the creative, original artwork used on the front cover flap. (75 words). (10)			
Spelling/Grammar / 10			
☐ Be sure to revise and edit your book jacket, checking for correct spelling, grammar, punctuation, and well-written paragraphs. (10)			
Overall Creativity & Neatness / 05			
☐ Try to be as creative as possible with your book jacket. Use lots of colors and use your imagination! Book jacket should be neatly put together, without torn or ripped edges or pieces of paper falling off. Written portions should be easy to read. (5)
